A Message from Pastor Michelle

Well, I have been your pastor now for over six months now. I was honored with a beautiful and meaningful Installation Service on Sunday, June 3 and we heard two amazing sermons from my wife Rev. Georgia Chambers and from Rev. Dr. Cassandra Gould.

As we close out the month of June, I want to take a moment to speak about June being Pride Month for the LGBTQ+ community. In June of 1969, there was a riot held in Stonewall, NY when some members of the LGBTQ+ community were murdered and arrested by police and because of the rising of the community, June became pride month here in the US and has subsequently been observed around the globe. We are proud of our being and who we are and we take the time to celebrate and affirm in ourselves our being created in God's image. On this past Sunday, Parkside, as an Open and Affirming Congregation of the UCC, affirmed and renewed our covenant to continue to offer welcome to the table of grace for all LGBTQ+ persons. As a member of the LGBTQ+ community, I continue to be humbled that I was called to pastor this wonderful faith community.

I am so excited by all the events and special worship services we have planned over the course of the next few months. 


Sunday, August 5th – Pastor Don Neiderfrank will be preaching, in connection with the celebration of 150 years.

Parkside Community UCC is taking on a new mission, this mission is to build awareness of human trafficking. This is not just a problem in other parts of the world, but it is happening in all 50 states and in each of Wisconsin's 72 counties.

The numbers are hard to pin down but some experts say Milwaukee is a hotbed for the activity. Trafficking is the 3rd most occurring crime, second to guns and drugs.

Trafficking occurs in both urban & rural areas. The main route through Wisconsin is Milwaukee \rightarrow Fox Cities/Green Bay \rightarrow Wausau \rightarrow Minneapolis.

Excerpt from medidad.publicbroadcasting: "What were you doing at age 13? For many people, the answer probably revolves around going to school and hanging out with friends. But that's not the case for all 13 year olds. In fact, 13 is the average age of girls who are sex trafficked across the country, according to Dana World-Patterson.

"When we go back to being 13 years old, we weren't thinking about how do we pleasure someone day in and day out with our bodies," she says.

World-Patterson chairs the Milwaukee human trafficking taskforce. For the past decade, she's been working to eradicate the problem here.

She says over time, awareness had grown about who

the victims are. "when we started 10 year ago, that's all we heard. That it was an inner city black girl—no father, poverty stricken problem."

World—Patterson says in reality, sex trafficking victims are often boys who are younger than 13 and girls, and men and women of varying ages and ethnic backgrounds. She says the crime is happening in all of Wisconsin's 72 counties. She says once people across the state began to pay attention, the way they thought about human trafficking started to change.

"It's opening the eyes of individuals in different counties that I believe just wanted to maintain the status quo

that said no, its an inner city thing. That's them over there," World-Patterson says.

She says the one thing that all victims have in common is that they are in some way vulnerable. As part of her quest to eradicate the crime, she educates people about what the traffickers look like.

"They show up as boyfriends. Now also be mindful of this, that it's not just men who are traffickers. So it's also the nice lady in the grocery store who approaches the girl at 11 o'clock at night like honey, why are you out here? Shouldn't you be at home? What's going on? So we also have to



be mindful of the smooth talking females that are also recruiting for this lifestyle," World-Patterson says.

World-Patterson says last year alone, hundreds of women went missing here (Wisconsin). And she says it's likely that many of them at least had some sort of contact with traffickers.

As part of an effort to stop sex trafficking, state lawmakers last fall passed legislation calling for truck drivers to be trained to recognize — and report — trafficking. And Wisconsin Attorney General Brad Schimel says the state has developed screening tools and training programs for medical staff and police officers to identify victims.

Schimel says now the goal is to crack down on the buyers. "These individuals are the ones who are creating the demand. If they're willing to pay for sex with people who are being trafficked, therefore, that's why the traffickers engage in this and have people working in modern day slavery."

He says one of the biggest challenges in eradicating sex trafficking is that it's an underground business.

"The people who are purchasing sex, they don't want to talk about what they're doing. The survivors are different than most crime victims because they've been manipulated and had so much fear instilled in them that don't come forward voluntarily either. And then of course the traffickers don't want to talk to us," Schimel says.

He says the days of street walkers are largely gone. Much of the sex trafficking now occurs online, also making it tough to track down the predators. Where Victims are Recruited: Internet Social Media School Shopping Mall Street/Park

Meanwhile, Dana World-Patterson — chair of the Milwaukee human trafficking taskforce — says there's another industry that needs to be targeted in order to cut down on trafficking: strip clubs.

She says she's known victim of trafficking as young as 13 who've been put to work as strippers."

Excerpt from the United Church of Christ: Trafficking in persons is a crime against humanity and ultimately a sin. Human trafficking denies the values of human life, exposes victims to serious health risks, endangers the mental well-being of victims and impedes the ability of victims to reach their full God-given potential. As Christians, we believe that every human being is created in the image and likeness of the divine Creator, of God. The prophets cried out against the exploitation of the poor and of laborers who are not treated fairly and compensated justly (Job 24:1-12, for example).

The United Church of Christ has consistently upheld the rights and dignity of workers and of women and children, believing that God calls us into community with each other as sisters and brothers, not as exploiters and exploited. The violence done to the physical, psychological and spiritual wellbeing of children and women who are forced into prostitution, the pornography industry, sex tourism and other forms of sexploitation are violations of the call of the Gospel of Jesus Christ to love our neighbors as ourselves. The kin -dom of God among us requires us to provide protection for those most vulnerable and to seek conditions which support wholeness and health for everyone.

In a resolution of witness entitled "<u>A Call to Awareness and Action to End the Practice of Trafficking in Per-</u> sons," the 27th General Synod of the United Church of Christ called on UCC members, congregations and various settings in the church to engage in education about the issue of trafficking in persons and advocacy efforts to end this criminal and abusive practice.

As a church community, Parkside's mission is to build awareness. We invite you to take a look at the new bulletin board by the elevator in our Fireside Room to learn more about this crime. Let's all help spread the word of this growing issue that is happening right here in Ozaukee County. Please consider attending the Washington County Anti-Trafficking Advocates for their monthly meeting on Tuesday, July 17 at 6:30pm to learn more. The meeting is held at the Jack Russell Memorial Library in Hartford. To share a ride to the meeting, contact Joan Brecke at 262-483-6795. Some of our members attended June's meeting and the speaker herself was a victim of sex trafficking, she was an honor student who was trafficked from a young age and into early adulthood and this all happened right down the road in Cedarburg.


