Greetings on this Beautiful Summer Day on the Second Official Day of Fall/Autumn!

In June, I attended the 32nd Gathering of the UCC General Synod which was held in Milwaukee at the Wisconsin Center. The General Synod of the UCC is held every two years to conduct the business of the United Church of Christ. The location rotates between our conferences around the country. The Wisconsin UCC Conference was the host for the gathering this summer. I was honored to be a delegate representing the Wisconsin Conference. During Synod, I had a wonderful opportunity to attend numerous voting plenaries on the floor. Here is a summary:



- · Resolution 1 A Resolution to Abolish the Growth and Existence of Private Prisons
- · Resolution 2 A Resolution on Ecumenical Relationship with Iglesia Evangelica Unida De Puerto Rico and Reaffirming the UCC's commitment to interreligious relations, & deploring religious bigotry
- · Resolution 3 Addressing the estate of global forced migration
- · Resolution 4 Establishing an action team to conduct a listening campaign and bring recommendations on the future of Christian witness at General Synod
- · Resolution 5 Resolution regarding the use of plastic foam (Styrofoam) and support for the Energy Innovation and Carbon Dividend Act of 2019
- · Resolution 6 Denouncing acts of violence, hatred, and racism carried out in the name of Neo-nazi and White Supremacist Ideologies
- · Resolution 7 Designating the Mental Health Network of the UCC as a Historically Underrepresented Group and this same designation for the Latinx community
- · Resolution 8 Stewardship of Exhibit Space as a Mission of Justice
- · Resolution 9 Supporting survivors of sexual violence through Breaking the Silence Sunday
- · Resolution 10- Calling on the US to "pull back from the brink" and prevent nuclear war
- · Resolution 11 Establishment of the Definition of the Basic Unit of Life and organization of UCC
- · Resolution 12- Resolution to bring Non-Binary Gender Language to the UCC Bylaws
- · Resolution 13-Resolution to the oversight and covenantal agreement between local churches as autonomous with the UCC

Each of these resolutions had committees that worked on exploring the language of the original resolutions which come from our conferences. As a delegate, I was assigned to committee 1 which talked about private prison reform. Our resolution passed overwhelmingly. Most of the resolutions passed with no huge problems on the floor. The most contentious resolutions was Resolution 8 and Resolution 6. The language was changed in committee on both of these issues and ended up being referred to the General Board of the UCC for further discussion and agreement. Resolution 8 addressed the issue of the "Faithful and Welcoming" movement within the UCC which state that they welcome all people but believe that LGBTQia persons are not conforming to the laws of God and do not affirm their identities and oppose the UCC continuing to have an affirmation of the LGBTQia community as a denominational stance. The Faithful and Welcoming Congregations wanted to have exhibit space in the exhibit hall. Many were opposed to it because of their beliefs. As a member of the LGBTQia community, I don't agree with the Faithful and Welcoming Congregations stance on my our identities but a hallmark of the UCC is that we all are able to express our opinions as local congregations and we will not always agree on our positions. The UCC is known as a welcoming denomination around the globe and for many people who have not received affirmation and love in other mainstream denominations, they find a home in the UCC. We cannot censure people's opinions and thoughts. I felt they should be allowed to have their space. If the majority of the persons attending the Synod gathering do not visit their booth, then they would get the message that not everyone holds their beliefs. They should be allowed to express themselves as freely as others. This is the way of the UCC. A more detailed listing of the resolutions can be found at: www.ucceverywhere.org/synod/

In addition, Rev. Dr. John Dorhauer was up for re-election as the General Minister and President of the UCC. He received a second term of 4 years by a vote of a little over 60% of the vote which is the minimum requirement for election. His election was controversial and contentious on the floor. He alienated a number of persons especially women when he said in his nomination speech before the election that "he felt it was past time for the UCC to have a Female General Minister and President but the Holy Spirit told him, he needed to run again". There was also problems with the "clickers" the delegates used to vote for the various resolutions and elections. Prayer was offered after the election but many left the floor with ambivalent and bitter feelings.

Overall, I really enjoyed attending the General Synod as a delegate for our conference. It was the first time I had ever attended Synod. It was very informative for me. I learned more about the denomination of which I hold my ordained ministerial standing. The happiest thing about my attendance was I got to connect with people from all phases of my eleven year journey as a member of the UCC. I even was able to see persons from my life and time in Berkeley, CA as a student at the UCC-affiliated Pacific School of Religion. It was such a joy and honor. I also got to meet and talk with our new Associate Conference Minister, Rev. Lorraine Ceniceros who supports the SW Association and was hired to assume the position formerly occupied by retiring Minister Rev. Joanne Thomson.

May you enjoy the beauty of God's creation as we enter the Fall Season in SE Wisconsin!


### CARD MINISTRY HELP NEEDED

**Beating Guns: Hope for People Who Are Weary of Violence**

Gun violence is a public health crisis. It is also a spiritual and moral crisis. More Americans have died from guns in the US in the last 50 years than in all the wars in American history. America also has the most annual gun deaths--homicide, suicide, and accidental gun deaths--at 105 per day, or more than 38,000 per year.

Some people say it's a heart problem. Others say it's a gun problem. We say it's both. God changes hearts, but people change laws. The biblical prophets Micah and Isaiah imagine a world where God's people beat their swords into plows and their spears into pruning hooks... transforming the tools of death into tools of life, building a world free of violence.



Shane Claiborne is a prominent speaker, activist and best-selling author. Shane worked with Mother Teresa in Calcutta, founded The Simple Way in Philadelphia and together with his friend Tony Campolo, heads up Red Letter Christians, a movement of folks who are committed to living "as if Jesus meant the things he said." Shane's latest book, Beating Guns: Hope for People Who are Weary of Violence, provides a provocative look at gun violence in America and shows why Christians should be concerned about gun violence and how they can be part of the solution.

You are invited to join us for a luncheon immediately following the lecture. Shane will answer questions about his program. The lunch will be held in the Laun Center, Room 209.


